

When skies turn dark, stormwater and where it goes are a concern of many homeowners across Ontario. The laws regulating the stormwater plans for new developments date back to 2003 and 2008, well before some record-breaking downpours.

Kanata-Carleton MPP Karen McCrimmon has introduced a private member's bill at Oueen's Park - an attempt to get new stormwater standards in place and also adding a requirement that the standards are reviewed every 10 years so that future weather trends are taken into account on a set schedule.

"I believe in climate change, and the intensity and duration of our storms have changed," said McCrimmon. The bill is known informally as the



Construction near Centrum expected to start this spring

Construction of a tunnel has been approved under Terry Fox Drive and work will begin this spring.

The roadway beneath will connect Earl Grey Drive, near Crazy Horse and Montana's, with Didsbury Road, near the Canadian Tire store.

The tunnel will allow drivers to move between the east and west sides of Terry Fox – and their many retail outlets – without using the busy

intersections above. Terry Fox currently has traffic lights at three spots within the space of a few hundred metres: at the Highway 417 off-ramp, at Didsbury/ Roland Michener Drive, and at Campeau.

Kanata Coun. Cathy Curry said the timing of lights at the intersections will be improved and physical modifications will be made in some spots while the tunnel is being constructed.

The proposal made by Maple Leaf Custom Homes consists of a 103-unit building-some at four storeys and some at five storeys. The city's brand new Official Plan caps the site at four floors.

The development plan also calls for five single-family homes along Halton, adjacent to existing homes.

Maple Leaf partner Brian Saumure said the makeup of the rental apartment units will likely see construction of 35 one-bedroom units, and the rest with two bedrooms or two bedrooms plus a den.

One resident said he was concerned about Halton becoming "a major thoroughfare" with many cars parked on the road.

"Realistically, people will have multiple vehicles and nowhere to park."

Another resident said drivers may well use Old Carp to reach Old Second Line and Terry Fox Drive to avoid busy March Road.

Saumure said construction would take about 18 months from the time the city approves the plans. He said the single-family homes would be built first.

The online information meeting hosted was by Kanata North Coun. Cathy Curry. Following the meeting, she said this may be a smaller development than some others along March Road, but it will add to the overall demands on the arterial road.

"It really has to be taken in context with all the other construction," Curry said. "Add it all up and it's compounding the problem."

She added that city staff will assess the request to increase the height to five storeys. "In isolation a request for





The Kanata Sharpening Shack's owner has carved out a space for himself in Kanata's hockey community.

Tyler Gordon is just 17 but has become a familiar face to many.

"Alot of parents say it's convenient because I'm at the same location where their kids play hockey," said Tyler. "The parents drop off the skates and then the kid picks them up half-dressed."

Tyler has been managing the Sharpening Shack in the Tony Graham Recreation Complex for almost six months. Being a minor, he needed a signature from his dad, Ken Gordon, to get it off the ground.

"I'm amazed at the drive he has being an entrepreneur," said Ken. "He helps little kids, and they gravitate around him "

to hand out free sharpenings

customers.

"It's not about taking their money," he said. "It's about making them feel like they're a person."

The teen said he jumped at the opportunity to manage the sharpening operation when the position opened.

"I knew I had the experience to back it up. I know a lot about hockey. I just knew there was nothing to lose by taking a couple days to make a business proposal," said Tyler, adding he's willing to take risks.

"I have the mindset of 'I might as well make the mistakes now because I can.""





Stormwater Flood Prevention Act, and McCrimmon's is seeking to have a draft report from 2022 turned into an Ontario law. That report – the Low Impact Development Stormwater Management Guidance Manual – was sent out for consultation by the Ford government in January 2022.

McCrimmon said the guidance manual is needed today, especially as construction is starting to boom with the push for more affordable housing. The manual – if followed – could also reduce flooding risks in existing neighbourhoods with basic upgrades such as bigger pipes and larger, deeper stormwater ponds.

#### \$145 BILLION RISK

McCrimmon said a provincial financial accountability report that dates back a few years estimates the cost of stormwater flooding could reach \$145 billion over the next 75 years "if we do nothing."

The Ontario auditor general issued a report on climate change adaptation that documented seven major urban floods in Ontario between 2012 and 2018 where the insured losses were more than \$80 million. Those costs end up being paid by taxpayers if the government helps victims financially, or insurance companies, with a resulting increase in local premiums. If there's no government action or a homeowner has no insurance, the cost is theirs to bear.

#### **GLEN CAIRN**

"We saw what can happen in Glen Cairn in 2009," McCrimmon said of the neighbourhood's flooding after another 100-year storm. "(The stormwater system there) met the standard at the time but it ended up with heartbreaking losses.

"So many communities have been affected by stormwater, I'm reaching out to all those MPPs whose ridings have been affected and asking them to help us pass this bill."

She said new construction can put both new homes and existing homes at risk if the stormwater runoff is accounted for using the out-of-date rainfall data in the guidelines.

"As we lose greenspace, we have less space that can absorb rainfall," she said. "In downpours the grass and the fields act like a sponge. We need houses, that's for sure, but we don't want to endanger others."

McCrimmon agreed that the Ford government – which has a majority at Queen's Park – could let her bill languish, and that the bill could even be criticized as extra red tape for the construction industry to deal with.

"They could say it's red tape but municipalities know this is the case. Municipalities say we need to update (the stormwater requirements) and they will hold the province to account."

She was also willing to ask the government to enact the guidance manual with a different piece of legislation, if that is their preference.

"Could they steal it? I hope so. I say, enact the manual, I'm good with it. They can take my idea and take all the credit but it's something we need now."

Second reading of McCrimmon's Stormwater Flood Prevention Act was scheduled for March 21, after which it could be voted on in the legislature or referred to a committee for study.




